THE OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE LEVINE BUILDING



Last week, Trinity had the honour of welcoming His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales to Trinity for the official opening of the Levine Building.

It was a short but packed visit. The Prince was welcomed on his arrival in College by the President, the Chancellor of the University, the Lord Lieutenant of Oxfordshire, and the Lord Mayor, after which he talked to some of the many students and staff assembled in Front Quad. The Prince, patron of the Grinling Gibbons Society's tercentenary celebrations, was then shown the chapel by Alan Lamb, who was responsible for the restoration of Trinity's splendid carvings.

With the architect Hugh Petter, the Prince walked through the gardens to the Levine Building's de Jager Auditorium, where, joining an audience of students, Fellows, staff and donors, he watched 'Metamorphosis', a movingly staged presentation by students, describing their time at Trinity and their aspirations for their future, and including a film highlighting the groundbreaking work of several of Trinity's Fellows.

His Royal Highness then addressed the audience to formally open the building. He acknowledged Oxford's role as a leading university, emphasised the importance of the Levine Building to the future of the college and thanked all those who have supported the building appeal. Afterwards, in the President's Garden, he met lead donor Peter Levine (1974) and other guests.
