# Events programme gets off to a flying start





The Events at Trinity programme of talks and recitals has drawn new audiences to Trinity.

The season began with a talk by Peter McCulloch, Professorial Fellow in Surgery, exploring how science can make surgery safer, which was followed by a conversation on the future of international criminal justice with Judge Ted Meron, Honorary Fellow and Visiting Professor of International Criminal Law. Last week Old Member David Simon (2003), partner and co-lead of global cyber incident response at Mayer Brown LLP, gave a thought-provoking talk about cyber warfare and ransomware.

Musical performances in the de Jager Auditorium have included a recital by pianist Pavel Kolesnikov and much of the programme of this year's Oxford Lieder Festival, for which Trinity was the partner college. There were Trinity connections to some of the festival events, with soprano Claire Booth (1996) giving two recitals, and an event remembering composer George Butterworth (1904), with songs performed by baritone Jonathan Eyers interspersed with a biographical talk on Butterworth by broadcaster and writer Kate Kennedy.

Among other events so far have been *Sold*, a performance based on the first autobiography of a black woman in Britain, and tours of the chapel and Old Library.


