

Brigadier So Assault Bde calls on me to see how we are getting on. Everyone is extremely interested in the idea & possesses a desire to see the first show. The O.P. would be a packed mass of senior officers if they all came! Letter from Rosemary. Good work continues in afternoon. Maj. + I find site for guns. Rain a bad & weather. In evening 73 LAA Regt. Paddy takes simple service in the van for our men - about 50 in all. Extremely well conducted & moving. Lesson from German on the Mount - good choice. Tent "Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof". Background of shells & aeroplanes. Afterwards we walk up to cemetery and plant on Paddy's grave an oaken cross bearing his name & the inscription "Who died most gallantly". The graveyard is well cared for and there are many wreaths from English friends & French people. The French girl on our farm comes with a posy to put on Paddy's grave.

Hear that Caen has been taken & Russians are 80 miles from E. Prussia. Impromptu concert with Gibb at piano & French people: "Clair de lune", Liszt, Beethoven, Gounod & "La Marseillaise".

Monday 10 July (D+34) (FIVE WEEKS)

Dull wet day. Troop on C & M. Capt. gets letter from Moto saying that he is in Roehampton Hospital & hopes to be back soon. Complete 88 M.R. conversion tables - what a headache! Send them in to be typed out. Pip returns from trip to Caen on m/c. Afternoon quiet. In evening up to Caen with Maj. Pip & Willie in jeep. See wreckage of tanks, Bren carriers, guns & equipment. Villages near Caen a complete shambles. On ridge before Caen the road is under German observation from factory chimneys in suburbs to

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
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Tuesday 10 July (D+34) Contd

Sout of R. Done. We accelerate over this strip of road, as shells are dropping here a tree is a notice by the road. "Beware - Shelling in progress". Some unpleasantly close ones, but we drop down from the ridge & follow a by-pass field track into Caen. We go as far as possible but this part of the town is a mass of rubble, many feet high, and eventually we are brought to a stop. The town is a pale wreath, though the towers of the two abbeys still stand. A priest & his helpers are searching among the ruins for the dead. We eventually return, speeded by more shells, & burn fire just ahead on the river bank which is our front line. On way back we notice mine-fields (all road verges are still mined - we were nearly caught!) booby-traps VDP shells, & lines of Sherman tanks waiting just over the ridge - an impressive sight. There are lots of quickly-made graves along the roadside - English & Germans. On way back F.W. has a seize chance of low clouds to pop out & strafe tanks a little way away. Unpleasantly close, so we take to ditch. Cows are in the fields killed by blast, with legs sticking up straight. The flat area between Bienville & Caen is the typical impression of a battlefield. Rum issue in evening. Letter from Mto. Gnr Hr. Bird returns from 5 Geocaching. Visit from Bde. Ettr.

Tuesday, 11 July (D+35)

Heavy air activity in early morning - bombs a few hundred yards away. Go to church in Henriville & have lunch &



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strung up. Talkative & witty, Barker — very good for my French. I act as interpreter for a stopfull of officers & O.R.s. Then down to HAA site & discuss problems of ballistics, meteorology & other matters connected with our 88 m.m. shooting. Our reputation is spreading & our task should be recorded in the annals of the Royal Regiment. 2 letters from Kate. Loud-speaker fixed up in orchard so that men can hear news. We are fighting hard S.W. & E'en. Americans advancing near St. do. Russians continue to make good progress. Spend afternoon with John Davies watching rehearsal of fire-control, with three guns, C.P. & Q.P.. Write to Kate.

Mosquito bites cover my face & it's difficult to shave in mornings; cover myself with citronella tonight. Temporal trouble with Phillips again.

Wednesday 12 July (D+36)

Heavy air activity early in morning, & bombs quite near. Practice ground alarm at 0830: take up positions for defence of camp. Hear that Highland Div. had a rest; time in their attack on Columbelle last night — losing 10 tanks & quite a few men. Bob comes over in afternoon with men from 4 Guardsmen belonging to Fox Tp: we are now complete. Spend evening making arrangements for Longdon & Prince to return to the dels. A whilst Evans Andle & Frist continue with 88 m.m. Boche starts to shell us at 2000 hrs & sends them in our front house & garden — one 1000 yards from me. We dive for cover. This continues spasmodically through evening — very unsatisfactory. Heavy air activity about 2000 hrs.

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Thursday 13 July (D+37)

Dull day again: left Langens det. goes out at 0930 hrs to 220/73 HAA Regt. I go with John Davies to Field Captain's Room to 86 Gen. Hosp. at La Delivrande to see Jack K. Patrick. He is to be operated on this afternoon & will have to be evacuated to U.K. Some of the tanks in the ward are bad. Pleasant morning. Back to camp & meet Capt. Tod who has come to arrange about Capt. Prince's detachment. In afternoon out on light-weight motorcycle to Benouville Bridge, Rough Colleville. See all the Hotta gliders still lying packed into the fields where they landed on D Day - hundreds of them. The bridge bears the name Pegasus Bridge, and fifty square yards of the road is screened with the coconut matting as it is under heavy observation. Take a look at the canal & then back to Hermanville. Another letter from Kate - better than a stiff dose of cognac. Men of 103 HAA arrive with Capt. Harry to work on 88 M.T. It is a beautiful gun - a sound piece with a mobile mounting. Better than anything we have (15 sec. into action - weighs 7½ tons!). Good sights & fuze-setter, but very poor A.A. transmission & electrical equipment. Fortunately Rat needn't worry us. Russians within 36 miles of E. Prussia. Vilna falls.

Friday 14 July (D+38)

Le Queroué Grillot. Fine day at last. Badly bitten by mosquitoes in night - lip & eye. Hung out French & English flags & Cross of Lorraine over gateway to farm & chalk "Vive la France" on all the tanks. Pilots also come over at 0815, Rang-Rables far 88 M.T. arrive. Half-day to celebrate. Stroll with Capt. down to Hermanville & go into the church and

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met le capitaine : Rem on take examination & find all the villages bare, having been looted, in their Sunday Best. Drink a couple of glasses of white wine & give a toast of le quatorze juillet to the company. Chat with an old friend le Grober, and with a very pretty dark French girl, about seventeen. The first really attractive girl I've seen. Unfortunately, escorted by two young Frenchmen! Back to the War Memorial, where two English soldiers stand guard, a salute. British & French flags on all the buildings. All the wine has been saved for today: tomorrow there will be none. Back for a magnificent lunch cooked by Madame — roast chicken, new potatoes & cauliflower. In afternoon visit Langdon's abt. & then round to l'ec - sur - Mer and la Delivrande, where I call at 86 Gen. Hoep. & find Kilpatrick gone to England. Back to Hermonville & meet cœurs who come out to thank the men for their gift to the children. Men are paraded & the thanks Rem. Then his speech is interpreted to them. He learns from Madame that he was an ardent collaborationist with le Sothe. In the evening we drink wine & talk with the French people of the house, and afterwards down to the village green to see the dancing. The Germans burnt the dancing floor because the French girls wouldn't dance with Rem, so it's sticky going on grass. Incipient romance between Marcelle and the Arthur left. Who was the first British soldier they saw. Back to the farm, & Gibb plays music, finishing with hearty rendering of Massilia. Musicians is very drunk by now. Heavy air activity at night. Rem (here for counter-martial) sleeps in town with us. Russians taken first.

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Saturday 15 July (D+39)

Spend morning working out conversion tables for range for 88 m.m. "Punch & Picture Post" from Katé. NAAFI stuff arrives — whisky, gin, beer etc. Round site. Dondini & Princess sites with Maj. Davey. Visit from Capt. Tod of 218 Bty.


Spasmodic shelling nearby — counter-battery. Great boughs of liquor round camp in evening. Hear Rat Russians are shelling Goods. Gibb plays a couple of Beethoven sonatas, and so to bed.

Sunday 16 July (D+40)

Slightly finer day; warm, but low cloud. Round sites with NAAFI stuff. In afternoon C. of Frigging into lots of watches &c. Ban ki-party with the French: ~~coffee~~ strawberry tart; gooseberries, Baba au rhum and coffee cake with peevy and white wine. Service at 1800 hrs. Heavy shelling both ways & Rick smoke screen all over beach & inland. ^{Yan} Likewise, ^{Yan} land bombing at about 2200 hrs. Quite a lively night all round: no casualties.

Monday 17 July (D+41) (SIX WEEKS)

In morning more work on 88 m.m.s. Early morning mist changes into marvellous sunny day later. Shelling at midday — smoke-screen goes up. Round sites in afternoon. Last night shells were at the bottom of our orchard, likewise a glider bomb. 80 bde held fire order comes through: AA very restricted now. Great drinking session in left trees in evening. All night long Pepe is incessant shelling both ways: our (G.S.) hydroboat is destroyed by a direct hit. He 177 over at 2230. To bed slightly squiffy. Amour moves up all night. Rumble like traffic in a London street.

Tuesday 18 July (0 + 42)

Awakened at 0500 by intense artillery barrage + passing of aircraft. Hop out to look + find a lovely sunny morning with pink clouds. The sky is filled with Lancasters + Halifaxes which pass over towards Caen in a continuous stream for two hours. Light Jerry flak, but see one Lanc. blow up in midair just above us. Over a thousand planes — an unforgettable sight. When Day stop Marauders + Liberators + Mitchells start to come over. The artillery barrage continues without break, and as we are in the middle of a "no-go" zone, we are shaken to pieces. Leave with John Davies in water-proof and go to 2nd Army HQ — see G.O.C. Visit Amm. people here to ask about 88 mm. ammo: none available. Hear news of PIs morning attack. Three thousand planes were used — 1,500 Lancs. + Halifaxes, 500 Marauders, + 1000 odd Liberators + Yorks. They were used to blow a gap in German defences to the E. of Caen, and as soon as the bombing ceased 11th Armored Div. moved in. By the time we heard the news they had gone six miles. Magnificent news: the beach-head has been getting too cramped + we went to expand. On to Bayeux where we lunch at Notre Dame Restaurant, visit cathedral + do shopping + see Bayeux Tapestry. The town is completely untouched + full of troops on leave + pretty girls. Notices about V.B. everywhere. Back via Arromanches where we see the immense artificial port that has been made here — a marvellous sight. Back to find letter from Kate. A good day indeed. Heavy air attack on Benouville bridge at about 2330. Bombs + planes. Attempt to interfere with our attack.


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(38) Friday 21
Wednesday 19 July (D+43)

Day starts dull. Morning in camp. Hear that our attack is going well & we are threatening to encircle Germans in Caenelles. The roads are packed with German prisoners returning from the front. Go out to Prince's site in Atlantic Wall strong-point at Arromanches: they had a warm time & plenty of action last night. (so did Londes's det.). Chief armament of his pill-box was old 75 mm.: also smaller cannon. In afternoon up to Caenelles; see prisoners in cage at St. Aubin. Several thunderstorms. The French are gathering round to jeer at Pommery & R.P.s here to protect them. In Italy Ancona a Legionnaire fallen, in Russia Shows is threatened. Jim breaks through in late afternoon. Dust on roads & hedge & trees is dreadful. Road construction goes on marvellously, but a cross-country journey is still a headache, with lots of bumpy diversions through fields, and too many mines about. Down to 101 BSA in evening to hear latest news. Slight air activity towards midnight.

Thursday 20 July (D+44)

In morning visit HQ of F/220 on cliffs at dior-sur-Mer. Were Londes's det. is to be deployed this evening. In afternoon finish reading Keightley: the warm sunny day suddenly turns to a thunderstorm & rain all evening. Two magazines arrive upon Kate. Out to F/220 again to settle 'accommodation' for Londes: abominable, wet. Not much war news today. Quiet night. Read some Georges Thuret. Hear of attempt to assassinate Hitler.



Friday 21 July (D+45)

Awake to thunderstorm & more rain. 88 H.M. work out of question so John Davies gives excellent lecture on Baltic States. Pouring rain all day until evening when it clears up. Then move into town for letter from wife. Round to Lodenki & Prince's S.P.S. with Maj. Dave. Letter from Kate: rep't immediately. Willie burns himself badly with petrol on hands & leg. John Davies & Pip are with us in the town now. Quiet night. Russians take Ostrov.

Saturday 22 July (D+46)

Dull day with rain again. Up to Bang-sur-Mer to visit Dust over men in AAOR: call in at Longden en way back. Ken's promotion to A/Capt. comes through. AIG takes last period of gun-drill; he is due to leave tonight. Arrange for Evans & Arrolle & Friz's dets. to go out tomorrow. Prince will return & be the only one in camp for maintenance of P.F.H.M. Receive apical from home with Landvertrags u writing materials & letters from Father & Mother. Heavy air activity.

Sunday 23rd July (D+47)

Russians take Pskov.

Dull day but no rain: ground begins to dry. Ken comes over from G.4 with three pips. Evans, Arrolle, & Friz take their dets. out to 40 H.M. sites & Prince comes back. Evening service. Heavy activity - one F.W. over at 500 ft. illuminated & shot.

Monday 24th July (D+48)

(SEVEN WEEKS)

First fine day for a long while: much gathering about guards. Take Ken round sites: talk of 88 H.M. Coast role: plan to establish separate HQ. lunchtime - what a relief. More colonial advances in Russia. Shells, AA-pie & tanks. Then our own air-raid goes in.

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Tuesday 25 July (D+49)

Attack launched in morning down road to Falaise, after heavy air & arty. bombardment all night. Maj. returns from 80 Bde. with plan to deploy 3 88 m.m. & one 4.50 m.m. in defence of lock-gates at Christchurch - a No. 1 priority job, right under the nose - and fire - of enemy. He takes train down to 16 F.C.P. in afternoon: I go to get hair-cut & change. In evening we walk round to Maj. Tearchis & are directed to an Australian officer in LAA for translation of 88 mm range-table (Bruce Cunningham). Heavy activity at night.

Wednesday 26 July (D+50)

Down to Christchurch in Peep: Heavy shelling all last night & this morning. Drop Bird & Phillips at 50 m.m. gun - pos. 5 to examine gun & on to Bruce Cunningham: crawl when under enemy obs. - shells unpleasant. He translates range-table. Leslie & says he'd like to join us. Back to 50 m.m. & find that it has been largely disabled - firing mechanism gone.

Beautiful sunshine & everything fresh & green: letter from Kate. In afternoon complete range-tables ready for calibration shoot on Saturday. In evening feel at peace w/ the world. Arrangements go ahead for our new rôle - anti-air commands. Have a shower bath. Heavy air & ground activity at night. Carl just misses being blown up by shell in orchard. Two hits on Courbet - fire started & one man killed.

Thursday 27 July (D+51)

Down to Maj. Johnston at F.C.P. in German strong-point with magnificent German periscope which looks straight across

shells on Chistocham & Cebiville areas.

night Friday 28 July (D+52)

(under fire again)

Down to F.C.P. To arrange signals hook-up for shoot: See
under how target selected - twin gun pos. position. Set arty-grid
& plot target on it. Sets return read, for shoot. Conference
with Lt & Maj. Johnson to discuss method of shoot. Russians
like Brast-d'Uvarsk. Yanks in outskirts of Constances & in Tessy.
Light air activity in evening. Continue to read "Rogue Heroes":
Shelling-Carb. drives round a corner in a jeep & has to stop
dead - crater still smoking!

Saturday 29 July (D+53)

Net wireless set in morning. Receive survey data for
gun positions. Deploy trace 885 on gun-pos. in afternoon.
Receive letter & photo from Rosemary. Russians closing on
Riga & Warsaw: Yanks 8 miles beyond Constances. See 244
jeep with killdeer. Morgan E. had shell-shock case. Shells
& bombs at night. P.p acquires his pup - Marcella admires

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
Sunday 30 July (D+54)

Yanks in Bréhal. Fine day with sunshine. In morning complete calculations on Artillery Board for shoot. The German police dogs put Loons Lope in our life: Pip spends most of his time with it. In afternoon up to gun-site at due for preparations for tomorrow. C.O. flies us off site & we wander around looking for a new site; I grapple with old tales provincial French. Very hot & tired & crowded. Back to find letter from Kate. In evening go to party in farmhouse again. Chocolate cake in Normandy style, sand cake à la Basque & Galette Bé-Honoré. Wine & wine — and so to bed. lovely night-sky, clear & starry.

Monday 31 July (D+55)

(EIGHT WEEKS)

Beautiful day and Yanks near Granville: our attack has gained 4 miles S. of Caumont. Lead 88th column to new position in middle of RASC dump just outside town. Blazing hot - oh, for a swim. Heavy sailing all day - 175 stuff at Caenelles now. Survey come down to position. Trig. point turns out to be in middle of vinefield: send for R.E.S. In afternoon have a delicious bath naked in warm sea at Lion: feel immensely cleaner & happier afterwards: lie to dry in sun. In evening up to officer's shop at Tharon & buy pyjamas & vests: in old chateau, run by RASC, with two pretty young French girls to cope with ATS underwear etc. ~~Pyjamas~~ Whisky with Q & 89th Majors.

Tuesday 1 August (D+56)

Dull day. Yanks S. of Avranches: line consolidated Caen-Avranches. Russians outside Riga, E. Prussia, Warsaw. Visit ~~from~~
B.R.A. ^{2nd Army} to open site to see how we are getting on. Drill session in afternoon. Swim again in evening, & find accommodation for shoot tomorrow. Spent afternoon & evening, Russians take Kaunas. Pips Troop still manning SO H.A. Take back art. Baby S.L. for immediate defence of port at Gavrostocham.

Wednesday 2 August (D+57) Morning of the shoot starts misty, clears towards midday. W/T comm. established by 1115 - shoot begins at 1140. All guns fired first by Longard - perfect condition. We then go on to fire 72 rounds, ranging 1, 2, 3 & 4 guns & giving salvos of grape for effect. Extremely good shoot: all rounds in a 400' square, all salvos in 150' by 50' oblong. Everybody very pleased: visitors include Brig. of 80 Bde, B.M., CRASCs, Combined Ops. Bombardment Offrs etc etc. I do G.P.O., Phillips G.P.O. A. Couching over Artz Board in blinding sunshine all day on calculations: but how good to plaster away! Hal half-dead in evening: calculations to Tp. from O.C., I.G., etc. History has been made... Yanks near Rennes & St. Malo in Brittany, 2nd Army line broken through to Vire. Canadians are holding German armour at Caen. Restless night - - lot of planes & shells. Two parcels from home.

Thursday 3 August (D+58) Playing 1st day off rest: straighten things out in morning & write letters. Balance & sun - take an afternoon. Marrot arrives in afternoon for E Tp. Yanks take Rennes & rush past: also take Dinan. Heavy air activity at night. Bombs v. close.

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Friday 4 August (D+59)

Another blazin day. Whole day out at Colleville, preparing the way for our open-position. Arrangements to requisition room for office. C.O. & Bill Smith arrive: 244 are over, deployed round SHAEF w/k barrels clamped! 62 still in England. Swim in evening.

Saturday 5 August (D+60)

Bull day. Turns fine later. Morning in camp. Afternoon at Colleville: cookhouse built, dug-outs nearly finished. Talk to people of house (M. & Mme Garnier). Junks in Brest, Nantes, Leval. Heavy attack by mosquitoes in evening!

Sunday 6 August (D+61)

Wrote day at Colleville: dug-outs coming along well: 3 sets now living there, construct a dwelling for myself. Lip swollen from mosq. bites. Yalla & RHQ move to Hermaville & come to see our site. Ungracious remarks about Far East. Also A/TK. re. Activity in air & small naval battle off Cristobal.

Monday 7 August (D+62) (NINE WEEKS)

Cold & misty in morn, turns beautiful later: finish off rest of adjustment to maisonette. Talk with le Gammier. Americans push on towards le Mans. German counter-attack at Mortain. Heavy air raid on German positions at midnight.

Tuesday 8 August (D+63)

Fine day from start: move to Colleville. First if not you - p.t. a blow the second. All day organising my quarters. Four letters in evening - none from Katie. Walk round the village in evening.

Wednesday 9 August (D+64)

Another marvellous day. Camp fully organised now. Excellent accommodation & cookhouse, ablutions & latrines. Blow dried gunpit. Find a real a salacious French woman. Much conversation with the Germans. C.O. comes up to camp about 88 m.m. Hear of direct hits by German 75 m.m. on D Tps 50 m.m. pits at Osnabrück. Canadiens 5 miles from Falaise (with Polish Armid Div.) Yanks in the ^{Nantes} Trans & Angers. Are very abundant. Find that the Germans sleep in dugout every night. Get fresh milk with Madeleine.

Thursday 10 August (D+65) All day preparing for shoot tomorrow - lining up & zeroing guns. Beautiful day. No special news, no letters. Evening long convers. with Germans.

Friday 11 August (D+66) Shoot from 1030 till 1330 23 rounds percussion ranging, Run 40 rounds airburst for effect. Scorching hot day. Bob & John come over from F. 4, Bill Lantz, C.O., 7a. Battall from 21 Arm Gp. etc. Spectate complete neutralization of German strong point Knock away camouflage, hit guns, put rounds in entrenches & to strong points etc. Hear about mines & R. compositions etc that E Tp shot down on F. 4. Considerable enemy counterbattery fire during shoot - some quite close - 75 m.m. (!) & rockets. Conference in evening with O.C. & I.G. Letter from Kate. Considerable activity at night.

Saturday 12 August (D+67) Blazing day again. Rest & read about Henri Fabre. Visit Royal Observatory. Weather & typhoon return. Cinema show in evening - "Tomorrows to Shoot About" & newreels

Sunday 13th August (D+68) Blazy, hot day again. Yanks in regions of Alençon & Chartres. Third gun goes in pit. Pip goes down with dysentery. In afternoon down to FCP to select targets for next shoot. Heavy shelling at Ouistreham. In evening came up two guns & zero Pern. Two others from Zone. (Maj. Garkyn & Peter killed by phos. bomb in Durlach; newspaper cutting.) Germans start to pull out of Normandie.

Monday 14th August (D+69) (TEN WEEKS)

Hot day again. Report of Yanks in Argentan, which only leaves a 20 mile gap for German escape. Heavy air bombardment of enemy escape routes. Came up B. 1 gun still suffering from touch of dysentery. Eisenhower's order of the day: Canadians attack towards Falaise: gap for escape narrows to 12 miles. Masses of aircraft going over in levels weather. Haircut & shampoo in Hermonville. Blund-to in evening. 6th Airborne attack across R. Orne & may call for artillery support. Germans may try something too. Heavy air-raid on Benouville. Bombs & cannon-fire, flares & m.g. fire from Ouistreham. All together a hectic night. Roger Keyes unfortunate letter from his wife.

Tuesday 15th August (D+70)

Shoot all day: start at 0.p. but return to gun pos. Fire at three targets - percussion for sea registration, A.P. at German strongpoint, airbursts at German battery. Fire 130 rounds. Feel rather sick still with slight temperature. We land in b. forces: escape gap narrows to 10 miles. Night-hot & feverish for me: sweating all night. Heavy air raids, & our guns in action max. range in C.D. role. Thunderstorm at 1900 hrs. Barrage balloons down all round.



Wednesday 16th August (D+71)

Temperature worse : spend quiet day. Canadians in outskirts of Falaise. Beach-head in S. France goes well. Parcel from home & letter from Duncan. Air-raids at night. Restless & little sleep. Visit from Cliff Humphett in afternoon.

Thursday 17th August (D+72)

Feel worse still. Rise at 10.30 a.m. to take shot at Le Homme. Fire Risty odd rounds & then B.M. 80 Bde stops us as attack is imminent. Retire to bed at tea-time finish Right Off Le Trap & dip into Weekend Book. Yanks in Chartres & Orleans. S. France goes well. Canadians take Falaise. Re pocket is much reduced. Exchange notes with Madeline to practice my French. Letters to Joanne to home.

Friday 18th August (D+73)

Feel better in morning : sunny day. Falaise gap nearly finished. Yanks 23 miles from Paris. 7th Army 25 miles inland on Banks River. Spend day quietly : much reading in Weekend Book. 
