



Introduction

Support for students, teachers & families

- More than 60 committed staff work on Access and Outreach across Oxford University, covering all the regions of the UK. Schools in each region have a named point of contact at one of the colleges or consortium of colleges from the University of Oxford.
- Trinity College is the main point of contact for Oxfordshire's schools within the University, and we work closely with the central Undergraduate Admissions Office to offer a range of programmes regularly available to students, their teachers, and families.

- On top of the core programme of outreach activities offered by Trinity College and the central University Admissions Office, many of the University's departments, museums, gardens and libraries offer a range of dedicated events, resources and opportunities for schools, students and families throughout the year. These are often targeted by age group, academic subject area or skill set
- Oxford for Oxford: in addition to the core programme available, Trinity College has now developed a new website Oxford for Oxford which we hope will act as a dedicated hub of information about outreach and access programmes available across all the University's departments, museums, gardens and libraries for Oxfordshire's schools.

Aims of our outreach

Why do we prioritise working with non-selective state schools – gaps in access between the sectors

2018-19 figures show that:

84.7% of independent school students progress to HE by age 19, and 56.4% of independent school students go to a high tariff university

Just **64%** students from non-selective state schools progress to HE, and only **16.8%** progress to high tariff universities

Schools and students with high priority

Lower progression

The Access Team at Trinity College prioritise outreach engagement with our linked non-selective state schools in Oxford based on specific needs related to **lower rates of progression** to Higher Education, to the Russell Group universities and to the University of Oxford.

Disadvantage

We also prioritise engagement with schools with higher rates of pupils who are under-represented and disadvantaged, for example, higher than average rates of pupils qualifying for free school meals, looked after children, services children, children with disabilities, first generation students.

Wherever possible, and particularly for the sessions for younger year groups, we ask that **50%** of participants have at least one of the higher priority indicators of disadvantage

Why do we prioritise working with students from disadvantaged backgrounds?

Only **26%** of those from lower income families go to university compared to **43%** of those from more affluent backgrounds

(SOCIAL MOBILITY COMMISSION, 2019).

Just **25.6%** of state-funded and special school pupils who received free school meals at age 15 entered higher education by age 19 by 2016/17

(MAJOR, L. E., BANERJEE.P. 2019)

Just **5%** of the most disadvantaged students gain a place at Russell Group unis, compared to **12%** of advantaged students.

Usually in Autumn or Spring term, suitable for all students in a Year 12 cohort, with much information that is applicable to a wide range of universities.

YR12 Oxbridge & the application process

Usually in Spring or Summer term, suitable for those expressing an interest in and/or having the potential to apply to Oxford and/or Cambridge (1 hr)

YR12 Personal Statement Workshop

Usually in late-Spring or Summer, suitable for all pupils and/or those applying to Oxford and/or Cambridge.

What else is on offer - in Oxford

Residential and blended programmes

- YR12 UNIQ: subject specific academic programme helps many students from diverse backgrounds apply to Oxford. Takes place during a spring or summer residential in Oxford
- YR12 Target Oxbridge: aims to help black African and Caribbean students and students of mixed race with black African and Caribbean heritage increase their chances of getting into the Universities of Oxford or Cambridge

Enrichment visits to Trinity College

All year groups in state primary and secondary schools

- Enrichment visit experiences are designed to give pupils a taste of undergraduate life at the University of Oxford and can be adapted for all year groups from YR1-YR13
- These enrichment experiences can include any of the outreach sessions plus a college tour, a taught Oxplore session, a taught session at one of our 5 museums, Q&A with our current students
- There is no charge for these visit experiences.

For YR13 Applicants

- Opportunity Oxford aims to prepare academically-talented students for university so that they can make the most of their abilities and enjoy their studies. All students have to do is apply to Oxford through UCAS in the normal way. If they are eligible, they will automatically be considered for a place on Opportunity Oxford. They will know if they are successful in receiving an offer from Oxford and a place on Opportunity Oxford in January, and at the same time as all our offers for undergraduate study are made every year.
- Foundation Oxford: a year-long course for UK state school students who have high academic potential, but have experienced severe personal disadvantage or disrupted education. Those offered places take part in a free, fully-funded, year-long bespoke subject-specific course at Oxford.
- With up to 50 places per year, Foundation Oxford will admit its first students for entry in October 2023. All applicants for this course must apply via UCAS by the January deadline in 2023.

Additional support for schools

Careers education

- The University of Oxford Careers Service also offer <u>Services for Schools</u> and have adapted a series of successful programmes that we use with undergraduate students, in tailored versions appropriate, usable, and effective for schools.
- Litmus is a careers toolkit which helps Careers Leaders and staff who support careers identify their students' aspirations, allocate resources where they can be most effective, and put their students' aspirations and experiences into a national and regional context.
- The programmes are free to schools and students in the maintained sector and are aimed at all learners within schools and colleges, not just those with particular careers destination in mind. What else is on offer from Trinity

For Teachers

- Our Online Teacher Support Programme is made up of six one and a half hour sessions each taking place after the school day. Whilst we begin the programme in January each year, we encourage teachers to join at any point or just for those sessions they would find most helpful. Whilst we offer a completion certificate for those attending all sessions there is no requirement to do so.
- The programme takes place online to enable teachers to join us at their convenience.
- In these sessions, we aim to provide up to date practical information and guidance relating to the Oxford application process and the purpose of each stage, for example, the admissions tests and interviews.
- We also have the broader aim of providing teachers with guidance that may help them to support their pupils in all higher education applications, as well as those who may have the potential to apply to Oxford.

The one-and-a-half-hour twilight sessions include:

- 1. An introduction to the University of Oxford and the admission process
- 2. Relevant enrichment activities for pupils raising attainment and enhancing future academic success
- 3. Supporting students through the process of writing a competitive personal statement
- 4. Writing the teacher reference what high tariff universities are looking for
- 5. The admissions tests supporting your pupils to prepare
- 6. The interview supporting your pupils to prepare

We particularly welcome colleagues from nonselective state schoolteachers who have little or no experience of the University of Oxford, pupil progression to the Russell Group or Higher Education in general.

For Families

Online live twilight sessions for all parents/ carers in which we cover general questions about HE costs and finance, student support and well-being. These interactive sessions give parents the chance to ask questions and meet current undergraduate students. The aims of our parent/ carer sessions are to explore:

- what the University of Oxford has to offer prospective applicants

I have an active interest in supporting looked-after children to reach their potential. As such, I am a foster carer and was previously the Vice Chair of a Fostering Approval panel.

I have also worked as a Home School Link Officer in the Partnership of West Oxfordshire primary and secondary schools, providing socio-educational support to disadvantaged pupils and their families.
